





TWENTY-YEAR-OLD HENRY DAVIS and his brother often looked out the back window of their home before they went to school. They were fascinated by the coming and going of people at the end of F Street, the other end of the alley where the old Ford's Theatre stood. One day, as the boys were watching, they saw a man on a horse being held by two men. The man was John Wilkes Booth, the famous actor and Confederate supporter who had just killed President Lincoln as he sat in his box, watching Our American Cousin at Ford's Theatre.

Booth had been trying to capture the president for months. Now the plan was to murder Mr. Lincoln, but this plan had come together only because of a chance meeting between Booth and his co-conspirators met at the Herndon House, which is now the site of the National Building Museum on North and F Streets. When the Government found out about the plot, it sent agents to catch Booth. On April 15, 1865, Lewis Powell would kill Secretary of State Seward, and George Atzerodt would kill President Johnson. Booth took Lincoln for himself.

Atzerodt was captured and hanged. Powell severely wounded Seward, but Powell failed to kill him. That night, Booth rode his horse through the center of town on F Street, and to the sound of cheering masses he rode away. Lincoln died at 7:22 the next morning. Booth would be apprehended and killed in a Virginia tobacco field 12 days later.




